A Message from the Pastor



Dear Brothers and Sisters,

This coming Wednesday, we will be at the half-way point of our Lenten journey. Perhaps this Lent has been a good one for you, a time of deepening your relationship with God. Or maybe Lent never really got off the ground, or it has been a little shaky. If that's the case, don't worry! There is still plenty of time to take advantage of this sacred season. Part of the "Lenten process" is learning not to fall into despair when you feel you have failed or have become complacent. Those thoughts, products of a negative mindset, are clearly the voice of the evil spirit that loves nothing more than to draw you away from God. The message of Lent is that your God is fiercely in love with you and will stop at nothing – not even the shedding of His Son's own blood – to bring you into communion with Him. No matter where you are on your journey, there is always time to start over and return to the Lord with your whole heart. Never despair!

A few items related to the remainder of Lent as we approach Holy Week:

This week, we will be having our **Joint-Parish Lenten Mission led by Fr. Roy Tvrdik**. As I mentioned in a previous bulletin, in light of Fr. Roy's ongoing recovery from bypass surgery just five weeks ago, we have simplified the mission style so that, instead of his having to present at each of the parishes separately, he can do so once to everyone. We are grateful for Fr. Roy's willingness to share with us on the sacramental life of the Church – Baptism, Confession and Eucharist. To ensure that there is enough space for everyone, the mission will be held at St. Gerard's – 7:15pm – Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday this week. For those who are unable to attend in person, the mission will be recorded and posted on the parish website for you to view.

As we approach Easter, one of the more joyful aspects is preparing **those who will be initiated into the Church** through Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist. Several from our parish will receive all three sacraments of initiation at the Easter Vigil and some others will complete their initiation later, on the feast of Pentecost. Grounded in the ancient tradition of the Church, the Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (OCIA) is the program of formation for adults who wish either to convert to Catholicism or to complete their reception of sacraments. Please keep these, our brothers and sisters, in your prayers in a particular way during this holy season. And may we each be deepened in our own identity as members of the Body of Christ, grafted onto Him inextricably and called to live in grace and unity.

And, finally, one of the hallmarks of Lent is a renewed commitment to charity. There are many ways you can fulfill this call to sacrificial love. One of them is by participating in our diocese's annual **Catholic Ministries Appeal**. You can find more information about the many ways this fund benefits people all across Long Island by providing a wealth of resources in our bulletin and on the diocesan website. Please consider sharing in this wider mission of our Church.

May you continue to have a meaningful Lent!

Lent is a wonderful time to celebrate the reconciling love and the healing grace our Lord offers us. Like all religious experience, Lent takes preparation.

Reconciliation is what God does. We prepare for it by opening ourselves up, by reflecting on the areas of darkness in our lives into which God so deeply desires to shine a light. It might begin with a simple question: Where might God be offering me forgiveness and healing? If my answer is, "I don't know," then I have some reflecting to do. I can examine my life—what I have done and what I have failed to do—and see what graces are offered me there. Coming to genuine sorrow for our sins is difficult. We might think that anything that makes us feel bad about ourselves is something to be avoided at all costs. If we avoid guilty feelings, we ask God to rouse in us a sense of embarrassment, leading to deep sorrow, about any way that we may not have been faithful, honest, loving, selfless,

or generous. We can look at our responsibilities as neighbors, employees, members of a parish or congregation, parents, spouses, sons, or daughters. We might be intimidated by the size of the problem that comes to mind when we ask where God might be offering us forgiveness and healing. It might be a pattern of bad behavior toward our spouses and family. It might be our vices. I might say, "I feel sorry for how I treat my spouse or my children." We may feel remorse for all the good intentions that never make their way into action. It is important not to stop there. No problem we have sums up all of who we are before God and others. The issues that come to mind might yield clues about some larger patterns. For example, I see that I tend to be loose with the truth at times. What does this reveal about me? I may discover that the real pattern of sin has to do with a deeper dishonesty or lack of integrity: hiding from God, leading a double life, not being who I really am called to be, trying to manage my life on my own terms, manipulating others for my own needs and desires. When the light of God's love shines into this level of self-awareness, I am touched by a powerful experience of reconciliation. Even here, in a place I might be most embarrassed and feel most naked, God is loving me and offering me wholeness and joy.

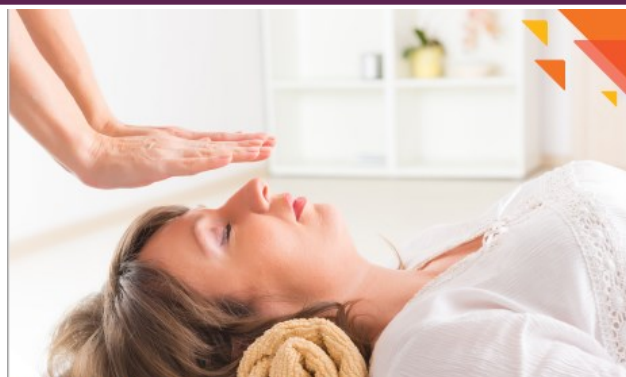
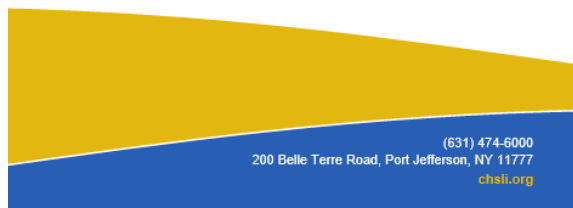

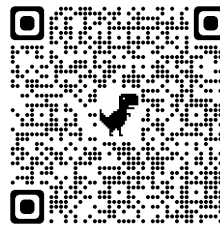

Breaking Open the Word

Reflecting on next Sunday's Gospel before you come to Mass can bring so much more meaning to your experience of the Liturgy. Here's the Gospel for next Sunday. How does this Gospel touch your life?

March 19, 2023

Third Sunday of Lent

Jn 9:1-41

As Jesus passed by he saw a man blind from birth. His disciples asked him, "Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?" Jesus answered, "Neither he nor his parents sinned; it is so that the works of God might be made visible through him. We have to do the works of the one who sent me while it is day. Night is coming when no one can work. While I am in the world, I am the light of the world." When he had said this, he spat on the ground and made clay with the saliva, and smeared the clay on his eyes, and said to him, "Go wash in the Pool of Siloam" — which means Sent—. So he went and washed, and came back able to see. His neighbors and those who had seen him earlier as a beggar said, "Isn't this the one who used to sit and beg?" Some said, "It is," but others said, "No, he just looks like him." He said, "I am." So they said to him, "How were your eyes opened?" He replied, "The man called Jesus made clay and anointed my eyes and told me, 'Go to Siloam and wash.' So I went there and washed and was able to see." And they said to him, "Where is he?" He said, "I don't know." They brought the one who was once blind to the Pharisees. Now Jesus had made clay and opened his eyes on a sabbath. So then the Pharisees also asked him how he was able to see. He said to them, "He put clay on my eyes, and I washed, and now I can see." So some of the Pharisees said, "This man is not from God, because he does not keep the sabbath." But others said, "How can a sinful man do such signs?" And there was a division among them. So they said to the blind man again, "What do you have to say about him, since he opened your eyes?" He said, "He is a prophet." Now the Jews did not believe that he had been blind and gained his sight until they summoned the parents of the one who had gained his sight. They asked them, "Is this your son, who you say was born blind? How does he now see?" His parents answered and said, "We know that this is our son and that he was born blind. We do not know how he sees now, nor do we know who opened his eyes. Ask him, he is of age; he can speak for himself." His parents said this because they were afraid of the Jews, for the Jews had already agreed that if anyone acknowledged him as the Christ, he would be expelled from the synagogue. For this reason his parents said, "He is of age; question him." So a second time they called the man who had been blind and said to him, "Give God the praise! We know that this man is a sinner." He replied, "If he is a sinner, I do not know. One thing I do know is that I was blind and now I see." So they said to him, "What did he do to you? How did he open your eyes?" He answered them, "I told you already and you did not listen. Why do you want to hear it again? Do you want to become his disciples, too?" They ridiculed him and said, "You are that man's disciple; we are disciples of Moses! We know that God spoke to Moses, but we do not know where this one is from." The man answered and said to them, "This is what is so amazing, that you do not know where he is from, yet he opened my eyes. We know that God does not listen to sinners, but if one is devout and does

his will, he listens to him. It is unheard of that anyone ever opened the eyes of a person born blind. If this man were not from God, he would not be able to do anything." They answered and said to him, "You were born totally in sin, and are you trying to teach us?" Then they threw him out. When Jesus heard that they had thrown him out, he found him and said, "Do you believe in the Son of Man?" He answered and said, "Who is he, sir, that I may believe in him?" Jesus said to him, "You have seen him, the one speaking with you is he." He said, "I do believe, Lord," and he worshiped him. Then Jesus said, "I came into this world for judgment, so that those who do not see might see, and those who do see might become blind." Some of the Pharisees who were with him heard this and said to him, "Surely we are not also blind, are we?" Jesus said to them, "If you were blind, you would have no sin; but now you are saying, 'We see,' so your sin remains.

Reflection Questions

- On the surface, this is a story about Jesus healing a man's physical blindness, but Jesus uses the physical healing to address spiritual blindness. What are some of the signs from the story that demonstrate that the Pharisees are spiritually blind?
- As the story unfolds, how do the man's references to Jesus indicate that his faith is growing?
- The man's parents were afraid to take a stand. The Pharisees themselves are divided about Jesus, but no one speaks out. Have you ever been afraid to take a stand?
- What is the problem with the Pharisees' attitude that made it impossible for them to learn from others?
- What kind of attitude should we have so that we can learn from others?
- In Baptism, Jesus reveals himself to us. We are called to be like the man, accepting the gift from Jesus so that we may truly see Jesus as our Lord and worship him.

Saint Patrick's Day and the Obligation to Abstain from Eating Meat

The holy Season of Lent is a time of spiritual preparation for the celebration of our Lord's passion, death, and resurrection at Easter, the holiest of days. Through prayer, fasting and works of charity, we draw closer to the Lord, deepen our faith, and prepare for eternal life. The obligation of abstinence from meat on Fridays of Lent is an important element of the Church's observance of the penitential nature of this holy season. However, if you choose not to abstain from meat on March 17th (St. Patrick's Day), please substitute some other penance, prayer, and work of charity in its place.

ST. PATRICK :: MARCH 17

"O God, who chose the Bishop Saint Patrick to preach your glory to the peoples of Ireland, grant, through his merits and intercession, that those who glory in the name of Christian may never cease to proclaim your wondrous deeds to all. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen."

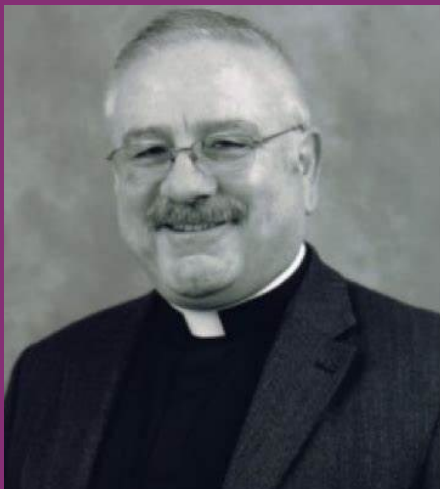

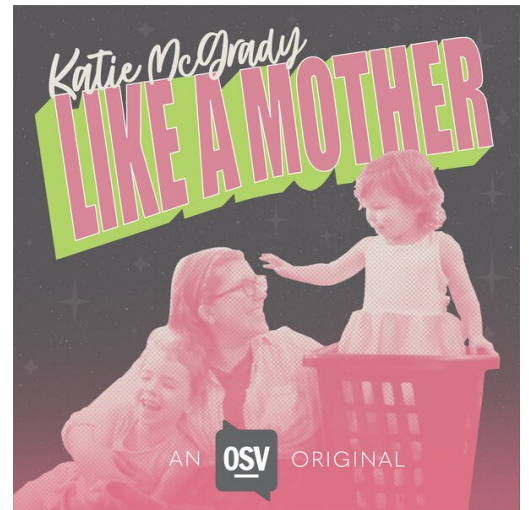

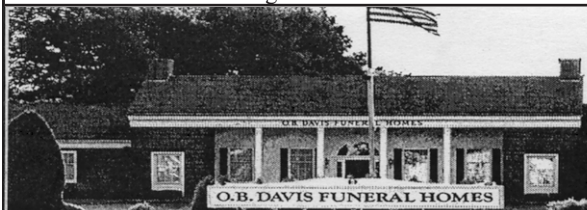
