True Presence of Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament

We come now to my final proof, the NINTH PROOF, Eucharistic miracles. A Eucharistic miracle most frequently involves a change in the appearance of a consecrated host. More often than not, the center of the host appears as a bloody fleshy substance, while the outer rim remains under the appearance of bread.

Dating as far back to the early Middle Ages, there have been well over a hundred Church-approved Eucharistic miracles and, in recent decades, a dozen Eucharistic miracles have occurred throughout the world. It seems to be happening with greater frequency now at a time when the belief in the True Presence of Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament is in decline. Is heaven trying to get our attention? I think so.

For the sake of brevity, I would like to describe just one such miracle. That Eucharistic miracle occurred in 2008, in the parish of St. Anthony of Padua, in Sokolka, Poland. During the distribution of Holy Communion, a consecrated host had fallen to the floor. The pastor put the host aside until after Mass and then, as the Church prescribes, placed the host in a cup of water to dissolve it. He then placed the cup with the host in it in the sacristy safe.

A week later, the pastor opened the safe to dispose properly of the water, presumably with a dissolved host in it. To his utter amazement, he found the host intact but changed in appearance. The very center of the host, approximately three-eighths of an inch in diameter, had changed into a bloody fleshy substance. Shortly thereafter, the pastor contacted the bishop who, a few weeks later, paid a visit to the parish to see for himself.

After several more weeks of observation, the bishop decided to have two dissected pieces of the host sent to two world-renowned forensic laboratories to determine their contents. Each specimen contained a piece of the inner bloody fleshy substance as well as the outer rim of the host that still remained under the appearance of bread. Neither laboratory was informed of the other's involvement.

Both laboratories came back with the identical results. The independent findings included the following; (1) it was heart tissue from a person severely beaten in the chest area, (2) the blood type was AB+ (only four percent of the world's population has that blood type) and is the same blood type found in every Eucharistic miracle, as well as the blood type found on the Shroud of Turin and the Sudarium, (3) the heart tissue was alive, which was truly astounding when you realize that human tissue can survive for only twenty minutes outside of a body, and this was months after its discovery. And finally (4), the scientists at these laboratories could not explain, nor were they aware of any scientific instruments in existence that could replicate, the intricate weaving of the ends of the heart tissue fibers with those of the bread fibers; so intricately were they woven together!

In this Eucharistic miracle in Sokolka, Poland, the consecrated host was - -

the Heart of Jesus truly present in the Blessed Sacrament!

Pope Francis established a World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly which took place for the first time on Sunday 25 July 2021 and for the second time on Sunday 24 July 2022.

The World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly will be celebrated for the third time in 2023 on Sunday 23 July – the Sunday closest to the **Feast of Saints Joachim and Anne**, Grandparents of Jesus. The theme chosen by Pope Francis for this year's celebration is: "His mercy is from age to age" (Luke 1:50).

The Catholic Grandparents Association has been at the forefront in campaigning for a greater recognition of Grandparents for their role and vocation in passing on their faith to the next generation. The announcement of a new Church-wide celebration for Grandparents and the elderly came in answer to our prayerful request to the Holy Father Pope Francis. This new worldwide celebration in the Universal Church calendar is a momentous achievement for Grandparents and the Elderly and will hopefully reassure them that they are loved and that they are needed.

Plenary Indulgence for the Third World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly

Just as with other editions, on the occasion of the Third World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly, which will be celebrated on July 23 and whose theme is "His mercy is from age to age" (Lk 1:50), Pope Francis has granted a Plenary Indulgence for the faithful. This announcement was made through a Decree issued today by the Apostolic Penitentiary, stating that the Plenary Indulgence is granted "under the usual conditions (Sacramental Confession, Eucharistic Communion and prayer in accordance with the intentions of the Supreme Pontiff) to grandparents, the elderly and all the faithful who, motivated by a true spirit of penance and charity, will participate in the solemn celebration that the Holy Father Francis will preside over in the Vatican Papal Basilica, or in the various functions that will be held throughout the world". In the same manner, the Plenary Indulgence will be granted to the faithful who visit their elderly brothers and sisters in need or in difficulty, "such as the sick, the abandoned, the disabled" and to "all those who, unable to leave their homes for serious reasons, will unite spiritually with the sacred services of World Youth Day, offering to the Merciful God their prayers, and the pains and sufferings of their lives, especially while the words of the Supreme Pontiff and the various celebrations are broadcast through the media".

Background on the Gospel Reading

In today's Gospel, Jesus offers three parables to describe the Kingdom of Heaven. He also explains why he speaks to the crowds in parables and interprets the parable of the sower for the disciples. This reading is a continuation of Jesus' discourse that we began reading last Sunday. All three parables use commonplace experiences to describe aspects of the Kingdom of Heaven. The first parable is longer and more detailed than the next two, and it alerts us to the two-fold reality of the Kingdom of Heaven. The beginnings of the Kingdom of Heaven can be found in this world. The fruition of the Kingdom of Heaven, however, will not be realized until the final judgment. In the meantime, as Jesus' explanation to the disciples cautions, any effort to judge the progress of the Kingdom of Heaven is premature. Only God, in the final judgment, will distinguish the fruit of the Kingdom of Heaven and offer its reward. The second and third parables call to our attention the abundance that will result from the small beginnings of the Kingdom of Heaven. Just as a mustard seed—the smallest of all seeds—will become a large bush, so too God will bring his Kingdom to full bloom. As a small amount of yeast will leaven the entire batch of bread, so too God will bring about the expansion of his Kingdom. In each case the image is of the superabundance that God brings out of even the smallest of signs of the Kingdom. Contained within these parables are words of caution as well as words of consolation. In the parable of the sower we are warned against judging others. To judge and uproot the "weeds" prematurely will harm the wheat; final judgment rests with God. In the parables of the mustard seed and the yeast, we are consoled by the message that God can work wonders and produce abundance from even the smallest beginnings of the Kingdom of Heaven. Taken together, the parables found in today's Gospel offer both a sobering reminder about the Kingdom of God and words of encouragement. As the wheat and the weeds must grow together until the harvest, so we may not know whether our actions contribute to God's Kingdom until God's final judgment. With this word of caution in mind, we act always in prayer that our actions will be consistent with God's plans.

In the parables of the mustard seed and the yeast, we hear words of encouragement. God can bring the Kingdom of Heaven from even the smallest of beginnings. Thus, we ask God to work through us for the sake of the Kingdom of Heaven. Set aside some time this week to make bread with your family. Show the amount of yeast that is required to raise an entire batch of bread. Observe that little things can go a long way. After the bread has been baked, gather together as a family. Read together today's Gospel, Matthew 13:24-43. Reflect together on what Jesus means when he teaches that the Kingdom of Heaven is like a mustard seed and like yeast. In these parables, Jesus is teaching us that God can work wonders from even the smallest beginnings of the Kingdom of God. This means that even the little things that we do can make a big difference in the lives of others. What are some of the little things that we can do in our family that help to make things better for others? Decide on one action to take together. Pray that God will use your action to make a difference in the world. Pray together the Lord's Prayer.

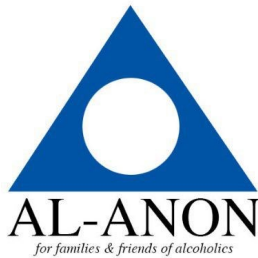

Breaking Open the Word

Reflecting on next Sunday's Gospel before you come to Mass can bring so much more meaning to your experience of the Liturgy. Here's the Gospel for next Sunday. How does this Gospel touch your life?

July 30, 2023

Seventeenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Mt 13:44-52

Jesus said to his disciples:

"The kingdom of heaven is like a treasure buried in a field, which a person finds and hides again, and out of joy goes and sells all that he has and buys that field. Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a merchant searching for fine pearls. When he finds a pearl of great price, he goes and sells all that he has and buys it. Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a net thrown into the sea, which collects fish of every kind. When it is full they haul it ashore and sit down to put what is good into buckets. What is bad they throw away. Thus it will be at the end of the age. The angels will go out and separate the wicked from the righteous and throw them into the fiery furnace, where there will be wailing and grinding of teeth.

"Do you understand all these things?" They answered, "Yes." And he replied, "Then every scribe who has been instructed in the kingdom of heaven is like the head of a household who brings from his storeroom both the new and the old."

Reflection Questions

- What did the person in the first parable do in order to gain the treasure buried in the field?
- What did the merchant do so that he could purchase the pearl of great price?
- In all of these parables, what is Jesus trying to teach us about?
- What is Jesus saying to us about the importance and value of the Kingdom of Heaven?
- Each of these people valued their possessions highly. However, they used these important, valuable things in order to get something they believed to be of even greater value. God wants us to place everything that we value in the service of the kingdom of heaven. How can you live His message this coming week?
